Commonwealth Caribbean Youth Unemployment Characteristics

- Lack of areas of interest to youth;

- Inexperience; and

Lack of resources (educational qualifications included)

2. Creative and innovative employment culture for wealth creation; and

3. Strategic partnerships.

Improving Employment

- Education;
- Vocational skillsets;
- Market expectations; and
- Entrepreneurial capabilities.

The Negative Occurrences

- 1. Braindrain;
- 2. Generation gaps due to high turnovers;
- 3. Alternative methods of livelihood;
- 4. Erratic economic growth;
- 5. Loss of cultural norms; and
- 6. Financial wastage

Considerations for Improvement

Re-evaluation of the national educational curriculum;

Vocational institutions to complement new job markets;

Imposition of irrational requirements;

Limited resources for entrepreneurs;

Considerations for Improvement (cont'd)

Media forms and agencies;

Emphasis on internships and job attachment opportunities; and

Professional certifications.
